

## Registered Apprenticeship Training

Apprenticeship is a system of learning a skilled trade through work experience. It combines on-the-job training with classroom instruction.

Emily Griffith Technical College offers apprenticeship programs in partnership with joint apprenticeship training centers and contractors or trade associations that are registered with the Office of Apprenticeship and Training.

The role of Emily Griffith Technical College is one supplying accreditation for the coursework, handling enrollment management, and providing college credit. **To apply for admission into any apprenticeship program, you must contact the program directly.** See back of sheet for specific contact information for each apprenticeship program.

Apprentices attend a minimum of 144 hours of classroom instruction and receive at least 2000 hours of on-the-job training each year.

### PROGRAM COSTS

Program costs vary. Generally the union, contractor, or trade association pays the majority of tuition and fees. Apprentices may pay union/association dues and book or tool fees.

# Registered Apprenticeship Training

## WHAT ARE THE ADVANTAGES OF APPRENTICESHIP?

- Earn a wage while learning the skills of the trade
- Enter into career pathways in construction, energy, and hospitality
- Receive progressive wage increases as your knowledge and ability advances
- Learn on-the-job from industry professionals
- Become a certified journey worker and prepare for licensing exams
- Earn up to 42 credits that can be transferred to community colleges throughout Colorado toward Associate of Applied Science degrees.

## AVERAGE WAGES

Hourly wages for on-the-job training vary per trade. The average starting wage is \$10.50 per hour. The average journey worker hourly wage is \$25.50.

## HOW DO I QUALIFY?

You must be at least 18 years of age. Women are encouraged to apply. Most trades require a High School Diploma or a GED Certificate.

It is very important that you have your own transportation to all job sites and classes, and you must be physically capable to perform the essential functions of the trade you wish to pursue.

## HOW LONG DOES IT TAKE?

The length of training runs between three to five years depending on the trade. Upon completion, you are awarded a certificate of completion that identifies you as a skilled crafts person.
